### **AKRON, OHIO - WHERE FUN IS ALIVE IN '25**

Where the Rubber

Meets the Rails!

July 6-12, 2025

Have you made your plans to join LOTS in Akron, OH for our 46<sup>th</sup> Annual Convention to be held July 6-12, 2025? We've managed to cram the best sites of Northeast Ohio into a week that promises great activities and wonderful memories.

Located just 40 miles south of Cleveland, the story of Akron is similar to many 19<sup>th</sup> century industrial cities. With the completion of the Ohio and Erie Canal in 1827 and the arrival of railroads soon thereafter, Akron became a transportation and manufacturing hub. The first rubber factory was built in Akron in 1871 and the city quickly became known as the "Rubber Capital of the World" as the industry grew. Firestone, General Tire,

Goodrich and Goodyear all called Akron "home" at some point. The hangar where Goodyear airships are built and maintained is found in Akron and is the largest structure in the world without internal support. From a more appetizing perspective, Akron boasts the invention of the ice cream cone

and caramel corn among its accomplishments.

Our convention hotel is the luxurious Hilton Garden Inn located at 1307 E. Market in the historic East



End neighborhood of Akron. Sporting a sleek, modern vibe, the hotel has an indoor pool and offers cable

TV, free WiFi access, coffee makers, microwaves, and refrigerators in each room. Other on-site

amenities include the Garden Grille and Bar that serves breakfast and dinner, free parking, and a 24-hour front desk to meet all



of your needs. Our preferred room rate is \$139.00 for single or double occupancy (no extra charge for children under 18 years.)

Reservations can be made now at 330-733-2900. Make sure to mention that you are with LOTS to

receive the group rate. Reservations must be received by June 14, 2025 and will be available thereafter only on a space and rate availability basis.

Located across the street from our hotel are the former headquarters of Goodyear Tire and Rubber Co. These buildings housed offices,



labs and even a theater. Our banquet will be held here in a former boardroom.

Our Rubber City Model Train Show will be held on Saturday, July 12 at Emidio's Exposition Center. Located at 48 E. Bath Road, Cuyahoga Falls, OH, Emidio's is a short 15-minute drive

from our convention hotel. The show

will be open to the public from 10 am to 3 pm but will open to convention registrants at 9:00 am to get

first shot at all the bargains. A highlight of every swap meet, our drag racing track will be set up for you to compete for the title of fastest loco in Akron.

### Tour #1: Pro Football Hall of Fame, Corner Field Model Railroad Museum, and Penca Layout

Monday, July 7 • Time: 8:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Adults: \$110, Children: \$91

<u>Pro Football Hall of Fame</u>: We literally kick off a great week of touring with a visit to the Pro Football Hall of Fame ("HOF".) Canton was chosen as



HOF's home due to the significant role it played in pro football history. The NFL (then known as the American Professional Football Association) was founded in Canton in 1920 and the *Canton Bulldogs* were an early power house in the fledgling league, being the first repeat champions (1922-23.) Community fundraising efforts for the future museum also helped to sway Canton's selection.

HOF opened its doors as a simple two room museum in 1963. Through several building



expansions, HOF now has 118,000 square feet of exhibits. Through 2024, the Hall has enshrined 378 of pro football's greatest players & contributors. Candidates for

induction must have been retired at least 5 years and are selected by a 50 member committee. A Senior's

committee also considers players retired more than 25 years and adds 1-2 names each year for the selection committee to consider. Inductees must receive at least an 80% vote of the committee. Exhibits highlight not just the exploits of players but the impact the NFL has



had on society. Several galleries run videos that include everything from amazing plays to a behind the scenes peek into what transpires in the locker room before a game.

Corner Field Model Railroad Museum: Corner Field Model Train Museum ("CFM") claims to be the largest family-owned O-gauge layout in the US and we're not going to argue. Open to the public in 2017, owner Tom Elesh, Sr. says this was a labor of love that was over 55 years in the making. Measuring 32' x 145' the layout has over 250 O-gauge engines (including the very latest from your favorite manufacturers,) 7,000' of track, 3,000 structures, 160 turnout switches and over 130 operating animations. The layout is constructed in a

freelance style and models everything from the 1940s through today. Included are numerous



freight and passenger yards, big and small urban areas, industrial sites, carnivals with numerous operating rides, a huge roundhouse, a replica of the

Empire State
Building, and
even an
intricate model
of Denver's
Union Station.
The layout
models many
locations
actually found



in Northeast Ohio and took 8 years to build. This is one of those layouts where the more you look, the more you see.

Evidence of Tom's commitment to family is everywhere. In large part, the layout was built to expose and attract children to the hobby. The operation is a family affair run by Tom, his wife Vicki, and children, Ashley and Tom, Jr., all of whom contributed to the construction and operation of the layout. The Corner Field name is derived from the large ballfield built in the family's front yard that Ashley wished for when recovering from a serious illness at age 10.

John Penca Layout: John Penca has been an active layout builder for almost 30 years, having built 5 layouts in that time. His previous layouts were all HO scale, but his current iteration is an O scale beauty. Modeling the Northeast Ohio region, John enjoys recreating the sights he saw during his railroading career with a strong sense of realism on his layout. One tip he offered is that painting trees on the backdrop helps to bring your layout to life. The layout is an "around the walls" design that



wastes no space in his basement. With over 150' of mainline track (he prefers Atlas,) John enjoys running engines and equipment from Lionel, MTH,



Atlas and Weaver. Included on the layout are buildings from Woodland

Scenics, MTH, Ameritown, and Menard's. If you look closely, you'll find over 200 people living on

John's pike. John's layout was featured in 2 OGR magazines in 2017 and just keeps getting better.

**Lunch:** Lunch will be a buffet served at *Mary Yoder's Amish Kitchen*. Traditional Amish foods such as all-you-can-eat



home-style meats, dressing, mashed potatoes, noodles, veggies, salad bar, and more are included.

### Tour #2: Cleveland History Center, Goodtime III Cruise, and Stan Hywet Hall and Gardens

Tuesday, July 8 • Time: 8:00 a.m. to 5:15 p.m. Adults: \$122. Children: \$89

<u>Cleveland History Center:</u> The Cleveland History Center houses nice displays of the history and development of Cleveland. Of special note are the Euclid Beach Park Grand Carousel and Crawford Auto Aviation Museum.

The Grand Carousel, built in 1910 by the Philadelphia Toboggan Co., replaced a smaller carousel at Cleveland's lakefront Euclid Beach Park. The Grand Carousel has



four rows of horses with 3 "jumper" rows and a fourth row featuring stationary nearly life-sized horses and chariots. Sold in 1969 when the park closed, the carousel was reacquired by Cleveland

benefactors in 1998. The carousel underwent extensive renovations and reopened to the public in 2014. Not just an exhibit, you will be able to step back in time and actually ride many of the horses created in 1910. You'll also enjoy the many handpainted scenes depicting Cleveland icons and Euclid Beach Park.

The Crawford Auto Aviation Museum boasts nearly 200 amazing vehicles including autos and aircraft.

The collection began when Frederick Crawford, President of Thompson Products,



learned that several historic cars displayed at the 1936-37 Great Lakes Expo in Cleveland, were to be



disposed of.
Acting quickly,
he acquired the
rarer autos
from the Expo,
thereby
beginning a
lifetime of
acquisition.
Crawford

instructed his travelling salesmen to be on the lookout for older cars resulting in many great "barn finds". The collection traces the early development of the automobile and includes pristine versions of a 1905 Stanley Steamer, 1912 Pierce Arrow, 1929 Minerva AM custom Limo to name but a few of the many gleaming vehicles on display.

**Goodtime III Cruise:** Come aboard, matey! The Goodtime III offers a unique two-hour narrated

cruise in Lake Erie and along the Cuyahoga River, providing great



views of downtown Cleveland, the Cleveland skyline, the Flats, and surrounding areas. You'll



learn of the history of Cleveland and how the Cuyahoga River, once one of the most polluted in the US, has recovered to be an environmental asset. With four decks to choose from, you'll have plenty of room to move about and can either enjoy the sun or relax on the temperature-controlled main deck.

Stan Hywet Hall and Gardens: Stan Hywet is the gilded age home and estate of F.A. Seiberling, cofounder of the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company. The Manor house was designed to accommodate their growing family and be an entertainment center for the Akron area. Construction of the Manor began in 1912 and the family moved in during 1915. Stan Hywet (old English for "stone quarry") was the Seiberlings' home for 40 years before it became a museum in 1957. Originally a vast estate of 3,000 acres, 70 acres around the Manor Home have been retained.



The estate is a national historic landmark containing 5 historic buildings including the Manor, which is the sixth largest historic home open to the public in the US. The Manor is one of the finest examples of the Tudor Revival style in America and employed



the finest materials available at the time. Housing three stories (four stories in the tower,) the Manor is 300' long and has 64,500 sq feet under roof. The interior décor evokes the feel of an English manor with a two-story Great Room and music room that can seat hundreds.

Outside the Manor, the Seiberlings employed renowned landscape architects to create a formal English garden, the "Great Garden" (that holds a rose garden, grape arbor and 15 planting beds for vegetables and flowers to decorate the manor,) and a birch tree allée that leads past the Great Garden to the Tea House. At the Tea House, visitors can overlook a lagoon and view the Cuyahoga Valley in the distance.

<u>Lunch</u>: Lunch will be on board the Goodtime III prior to cruise departure. The buffet will include either chicken piccata or braised beef brisket (chef's choice,) carrots, smashed or whipped potatoes, focaccia bread, fruit cup, and cookies or brownies.

### Tour #3: RubberDucks Baseball Game

Tuesday, July 8 • Time: 6:00 p.m. till game end Adults: \$26, Children: \$26

There is nothing like watching America's pastime in the middle of summer. Join us as at Akron's Canal Park as the RubberDucks (the AA affiliate of the Cleveland Guardians) take on the Richmond Flying Squirrels. Game time is 6:35 pm and transportation is included. Dinner is on your own at the ballpark.

### Tour #4: Fannie May, McKinley Presidential Library and Museum, Ohio and Erie Canal, Cuyahoga Valley Railroad Train Ride

Wednesday, July 9 • Time: 8:30 a.m. to 5:15 p.m. Adults: \$89, Children: \$81

Fannie May: Who can turn down the sweet treats offered at Fannie May? From the success of butter creams in the 1920's to the introduction of Pixies in 1946 to Mint Meltaways in 1963, Fannie Mae has been a leader in selling fine chocolates for over 100 years. You will hear the history of Fannie May, learn about the chocolate-making process, and see where the magic happens in their behind the scenes factory tour. After that, you will have a chance to buy some of these great chocolates in Fannie May's iconic store with red and white striped awnings.

### **McKinley Presidential Library and Museum:**

The history of Stark County, OH and the story of our 25<sup>th</sup> President share space in this Museum. One of seven Presidents from Ohio, McKinley was assassinated in 1901 while in office. Despite this, he is now viewed as a decisive leader who set the US on a course to becoming a world power. Since McKinley's home was razed before the preservation movement could save it, the Library focuses on collecting and preserving artifacts associated with the President. In the McKinley Gallery, furniture



and various belongings of McKinley are displayed, and an animatronic President and First Lady speak



to audiences on topics of the day.

Elsewhere in the museum, a "Streets of Yesteryear" gallery allows you to saunter past store windows typical of a small early 1900s Ohio town including stores, offices, a hotel, and a gas

station. On display are various artifacts appropriate for each type of business. Of particular note is a nice HO layout depicting the 1940s era of railroading in Northeast Ohio. The local club has a large collection of HO engines on display.

Outside the Museum is the impressive McKinley Memorial. Built by a grieving nation, the marble

and granite
edifice sits atop
a high hill within
yards of the
Museum. The
President's body
was moved to
the Memorial in
1907 and the
Memorial
remains open to
visitors as a
solemn reminder
that freedom can



come with a high cost. During our lunch, a museum staff member will share interesting details of the life and times of President McKinley.

Erie Canal and Cuyahoga Valley Railroad: The Cuyahoga Valley National Park ("CVNP") became one of our newest National Parks in 2000. The park encompasses parts of the Cuyahoga River and the Ohio and Erie Canal that was constructed near the river during the 1820s. Initially connecting Akron to Cleveland and Lake Erie, the canal was ultimately extended through Columbus all the way to the Ohio River near Portsmouth, OH. The canal carried freight from 1827 to 1861 when the construction of railroads reduced demand. Once largely ignored and abandoned, parts of the canal have become a

National Heritage Area, providing green spaces for recreation and enjoyment.

To overcome differences in height and terrain, locks had to be constructed at strategic points along the canal. CVNP has a couple of locks within the park and the Canal Exploration Center offers information and a demonstration on how these locks work.

The Valley Railroad was built in the 1870s and began service in 1880 through land now comprising

the CVNP.
The railroad later came under the control of the B&O Railroad and was



purchased outright in 1915. After CSX abandoned 26 miles of rail running through the park in 1985, the National Park Service bought the rail rights in 1987. Shortly thereafter, the scenic railroad (now known Cuyahoga Valley Scenic Railroad) resumed train rides through the park. As we travel along the rushing Cuyahoga River during our 1½ hour train ride, you may spot eagles, deer, beavers, and heron as we pass through the lakes, forests, marshes, and quarries of the park.

<u>Lunch</u>: Box lunches will be served at the McKinley Presidential Library during a presentation by staff members. Choose from a turkey or roast beef sandwich or veggie sub and indicate your preference on your registration.

### Tour #5: Age of Steam Roundhouse Museum, Ernest Warthur Museum and Gardens, MAPS Air Museum

Thursday, July10 • Time: 8:00 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. Adults: \$105, Children: \$91

**Age of Steam Roundhouse Museum:** So why would anyone build a brand new steam roundhouse

in 2010? To store your steamers in, of course! That's what Jerry Jacobson did when he retired from





railroading in 2008. After amassing a collection of 23 steam locos and an assortment of diesels, freight,

and passenger cars, and miscellaneous equipment, Jerry bought and developed a 34-acre property to store his treasures. The site contains the amazing 18-stall roundhouse, a 115' roundtable, depot, coal loader,



wooden water tank, and two miles of storage tracks. His foundation now operates the museum for the purpose of restoring and preserving historically relevant railroad equipment and to educate people about the important role railroads played in the growth of the US. We'll enjoy a guided tour of the roundhouse and its locos, and even see the shops where museum staff maintains the collection.

Ernest Warthur Museum and Gardens: The Ernest "Mooney" Warther Museum and Gardens pays tribute to the master carver who integrated his



love of steam trains into his hobby. His life's work of 54

intricate models tracks the history of steam engines from Sir Isaac Newton's sketches to modern behemoths that belched fire and cinders well into the 20<sup>th</sup> century. Using knives he designed, Warther transformed wood and ivory into artistic



marvels that earned him accolades from even the Smithsonian. Paying tribute to one of the men Mooney admired most in life, one of Mooney's most impressive models is a 7-foot long depiction of Lincoln's funeral train assembled from thousands of pieces without glue. It is so detailed that Lincoln can be seen lying in his coffin through a railcar window.

**MAPS Air Museum:** MAPS traces the history of aviation from early flight to modern aircraft. With

an emphasis on military aircraft, you will see examples of many of the aircraft that kept America

a dominant power throughout the 20<sup>th</sup> century. Everything from a WWII's P-51 *Mustang*, to a nimble Blue Angels *Skyhawk*, to the colossal C-130 *Hercules* can be seen up close and personal. In fact, you can actually go into some of the aircraft. Other memorable items include the gondola from a Goodyear blimp and fully stocked military Field Hospital!

MAPS is more than just propellers and wings, however. Numerous exhibits share the stories of ordinary men and women who achieved extraordinary accomplishments. One area contains

exhibits from the Ohio Military Museum and



displays artifacts of local heroes going back as far as the War of 1812. Another exhibit honors Ohioans who were awarded the Medal of Honor and describes the deeds that earned them the highest military honor awarded in the US.

**Lunch:** Box lunches will be served at the Warther Museum. Choose from a cranberry pecan salad, chicken salad croissant, or ham/turkey sub, and indicate your preference on your registration.

#### **Tour #6: Layout Tours**

Today is layout day – one of the highlights of every convention! Here is what's in store for you:

Charlie Easton layout: Charlie is the President of the local TCA Division and has been into model trains since he received a Marx train when just 7 years old. His U-shaped layout sits in a 14' x 22' room and features soaring mountains, tall buildings and long bridges, many of which were scratch-built.

Perhaps the most impressive bridge was the custom-built double deck lift bridge that allows access to the room without ducking!





<u>Alan Lakis layout:</u> The art of model railroading is evident on Al's layout. Besides a plethora of great

trains and realistic scenery, you'll be struck by the amazing mural that runs seamlessly from layout to ceiling, creating an artistic masterpiece. There is no doubt why Classic Toy Trains chose to



feature this pike in a recent issue.

<u>Ian Vago layout:</u> Featured in TM Video #12, Ian's basement is a robust marriage between collection and layout. His walls are lined with shelves filled



with pristine post-war and tin-plate collectibles in both O and G gauge. Ian is not afraid to run many of his rare treasures and the vibrant colors of his buildings make a great backdrop for his speeding trains. This is a collection not to be missed.

<u>Olmstead Falls Depot layouts:</u> What could be better than a layout in a real train depot? How about four layouts? This club models N, HO, O and



G scales and does all of them well. While HO is the largest layout, the O layout shows some real modeling

skill. Most every nook and cranny of the depot is filled with trains except for the station master's office near its center.

<u>Lunch</u>: We'll enjoy a buffet at the 3 Spot Restaurant featuring a Party Menu of pasta, meatballs, salad, sliders and similar offerings.

The LOTS Annual Train Show will be held at Emidio and Sons Expo Center, 48 E. Bath Rd., Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio 44223. Attendance to the show is free for all LOTS Members and their guests beginning at 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, July 12, as long as they are wearing their 2025 Convention name badges. Emidio and Sons Expo Center is located approximately 15 minutes from the hotel.
